



First time registering for an event?

Read important information below regarding Unit Numbers:

Your unit, whether it is a Cub Scout Pack, Scout Troop, Venture Crew, or Explorer Post has a four-digit number. This four-digit number might be different than the number you refer to your unit as. For example, you might belong to boy and girl Cub Scout Pack 1, but when registering for an event on the Buckeye Council website, you should use your four-digit unit number and designation – Cub Scout Pack 1001 – FP.

How do you figure out your four-digit number and designation? Read below for simple instructions!

Every unit number is a four-digit number PLUS a unit type designation.

- FP – Family Pack (boy and girl pack)
- BP – Boy Pack
- GP – Girl Pack
- GT – Girl Troop
- BP – Boy Troop
- N/A – all crews

How to determine your four-digit number:



The first number represents your district prefix:

- 1 = Hetuck** (Stark County)
- 2 = Sandy Beaver** (Columbiana County + Alliance)
- 4 = Killbuck** (Wayne + Holmes County)
- 5 = Netawotwes** (Tuscarawas + Carroll County)
- 6 = Harding Area** (Wyandott, Marion, Morrow, Crawford County)
- 7 = Johnny Appleseed Trail** (Ashland + Richland County)
- 9 = Tuskegee** (Canton City, ScoutReach)

The last three numbers represent your unit number:

This is the number that is on your uniform sleeve! This is the number your unit calls itself. Look at your uniform to find out your unit number.
